Sometimes the best way to do just that is through art, creating it, being a part of it in some way or simply, just viewing it. And have we mentioned that the arts are an essential component to health, healing and well-being, recently? Please introduce yourself: My name is Niki Lopez and I am a multi-media visual artist, independent graphic designer, and mom. Proud of my Panamanian, Jamaican, & Cuban heritage and born in New York, in other words - a true Floridian. I live in a art community and have been exhibiting my art since 2008. I also produce a yearly month long art event that combines art, performance and community

What can you tell us about your art piece/ how would you describe it? "Still Beautiful" this painting was originally created for, and juried selected into Soffer Art Collective's annual poster fundraiser – that was showcased in South Florida and New York. The poster show's silent auction benefited a breast cancer

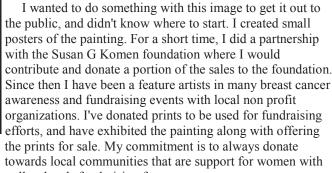


Niki Lopez, Still Beautiful, 2009 Acrylic on canvas, Dimensions: 20"x34"

awareness group. Even though the theme was opened, I choose to do a painting that not only showed a graphic presentation of breast cancer, but also symbolizes the beauty, power and strength that still exist in the women that have gone through cancer and our families that have been affected. The choice to paint the woman female in this painting as pink is because breast cancer affects all races. The responses I get from showing the scar so boldly has been mixed. Some feel it may be too graphic, and others, ironically other women who have had cancer or have had a love one go through it has felt more drawn to the image because of it. For me, I didn't want to

I also share great finds from other breast cancer pages as well as give some of the posters away there. Though the poster art is for sale, the focus is being a support and sharing information and smiles. It's always great to get emails from many people around the globe that has somehow come in contact with my painting and compelled to share their story or how they relate to the painting with me. Over the years, a few people have asked me have I personally gone through the ordeal. I have not. I do have some family members who has battled with cancer and breast cancer, but for me it's something that has evolved and each time a stranger contacts me and share their story with me, I feel compelled to keep the page up and share more. It's the little things at times that can mean so much.

What are you trying to communicate with your art? My art is not confined to a single body of work. My work tends to be creative self-expressions and explore stories, symbols and concepts from ancient cultures and ideologies, as well as provoke thought as to the beliefs in other dimensions, and universes. Some of my work is abstract and me just exploring my canvas.

As told by German Artist, Uta Nichts.

Born in Ediger-Eller Germany, Uta began showing an interest in the arts as early as Kindergarten where she showed an affinity for sculpture and painting. Like many a great artist before her, Uta felt compelled to create. She followed her passion into her teen years where she began to explore other facets of expression involving doll making and puppetry; this foré resulted in several juried prizes.

Uta went on to win many other contests in Germany displaying her full array of talents but then decided to take a spiritual break from the physical aspects of art to seek other forms of expression.

Uta then came to the United States in 1987 to discover an entirely new culture. During this time period Uta exhibited her work in various Galleries. Uta is an ever evolving spirit who sees art as a pathway to the soul. Uta Nichts resides in Miami Florida.

That's how my Bio read before 2009. To make a long story short and not so boring I start with a wonderful evening on the

Perfect light, pink colors in the sky, just before the sun sets for the night. Accompanied by a great friend, a friend I had to promise after my return to Miami to get my breast checked. I was feeling discomforted and pain in my left breast

Uta Nichts Breast Cancer Awareness Body Painting Project 9-16-2012 for some time. So I did, again long story short, Mammogram and off to a biopsy on July 16 2009, July 17 2009 all hell broke loose. The Pathology report 7 pages long,

Invasive ductal carcinoma, Grade III, Estrogen receptor: negative, Progesterone receptor: negative, HER2 (Hercept test): negative. In other words: triple negative, no hormone receptor involved, very little studies done on this kind of cancer. Only 10% of women with breast cancer are diagnosed with triple negative, therefore I decided to undergo a double mastectomy and Chemo. I choose to approach this cancer growing in my breast with aggressive western medicine tools, even though my heart and gut where directing me to the holistic,

natural healing kind of method. Anyway... From July 17 2009 to end of April 2010 I only operated on survival mode. I was busy making decisions for getting the operation scheduled, doing research on a good reliable plastic surgeon, finding a suitable Oncologist, creating my support team for the new chapter in my life. Check $\sqrt{\text{check}}$

 $\sqrt{\mathbf{check}} \sqrt{\mathbf{and}} \mathbf{done}$!

Forwarding to the now 2013 and at this moment I'm cancer free. So much I would do different now after the fact...WOW, what a journey! I call it "the good the bad and the ugly" (Favorite movie of my friend who had urged me to see a doctor) Let's start with the good: I'm cancer free for the moment and I do my best to stay that way. I changed so much in my life since then. Anything and everything I can do to keep a healthy lifestyle!!! Is my priority. The bad: All the pain I had to endure, but all this is in the past now, time heals all wounds, just be patient and take it one day at the time! The ugly: WOW! Now you get me started, but because it is in the past and we can't change the past I choose NOW not dwell on it anymore! **Instead:** I want to address some pointers to put on your checklist if you ever have to go through any illness or obstacles in your life. Stay calm and take a deep breath as many as you need, go inward and listen to your inner voice, seek as much information as you can, we are fortunate in this time and era to have the internet and hotlines, please take advantage of that great tool.

Don't be shy or insecure to ask questions, tape all your conversations with doctors or healthcare providers, so nothing will get lost and you can go back and listen to what was said again, because you will be overwhelmed by all what is said and mentioned. Belief in yourself as your higher power, only you can make the decisions for yourself, nobody else will or wants to take that burden on their shoulders, not even your family or closes friends. Don't feel disappointed by that, they don't know better and they shouldn't, because it is your business to take care of yourself. And please know there is always a light at the end of the tunnel!!! Here's a Poem I wrote during my walk through the tunnel.

> Dark shadows and darkness came over me the sparkling light has gone? Until recently, the sun was shining in my world! And now I'm falling into a deep hole, what awaits me down there? Hopefully something that heals my wounds Do not give up I say to myself Is anyone else here...

I'm also happy to announce, I became an Wellness Ambassador and Cancer Warrior. I teach workshops. Some of my favorite workshops are called Uta's Trust and Take Care of Yourself program Healing Beauty from the inside out and many more. CERVICAL CANCER SCREENING

Cervical Cancer occurs when abnormal cells in the cervix grow out of control. All women are at risk for developing cervical cancer (especially those over 30 years of age). Cervical cancer screening can help detect and prevent cervical cancer. Women should begin cervical cancer screening at age 21. Cervical cancer screening should be done every year. The human papillomavirus

(HPV) is the main cause of cervical cancer. You can get HPV by having sexual contact with someone who has HPV.
